The BiblioVerifica is an ongoing conversation with citizens, centering around a specific fact or questions, by supporting search in the media that they consume. The focus of these engagement practices is to foster citizens to develop debates and ana-lytical reasoning in the interaction and processing of information, without political propaganda or biased ideology.

Librarians play a facilitating role in supporting citizens in order to verify facts and news using good practices, sharing collaborative space and tools, focusing on

reliable open resources. It means promoting fact-checking to fight the misinformation, shar-ing strategies based on principles of accuracy, traceability, transparency, accountabil-ity, indipendence and impartiality.
